

2008: An emphasis on implementation

The civic euphoria that carried over into 2008 following the November 2007 "We the People" Town Meeting was gratifying and promising. Hundreds of town meeting participants stepped up to be part of the implementation of recommendations that came forth from the unprecedented civic assembly.

Since then, the "We the People" database has doubled to more than 1,200 and several ideas from the town meeting are now top citizen priorities: expanded recycling, openness and transparency in government, the transformation of Owensboro's downtown and more. The closing of the Executive Inn heightened the sense of urgency to invest in our downtown and revive our convention industry.

A "We the People" Executive Board and Leadership Council were established. We secured an executive director. Quarterly "We the People" meetings attracted impressive crowds. Citizen groups, leaders and committees were established. Public access television covered events. Appearances were made to civic and school groups, radio and television talk shows. Newsletters, email blasts and blogs are connecting citizens.

Despite the shocking 2008 financial meltdown and the corresponding layoffs, devaluation of assets and borrowing power that accompany it, a bullish tone characterizes Owensboro-Daviess County. In addition to an ambitious riverfront and downtown master plan, leaders charge ahead with a new \$500 million hospital, a new campus for Western Kentucky University-Owensboro, a business accelerator, a new local government incentive policy, biotech partnerships and cancer research facilities, a dental clinic for low income youth and adults, several new elementary schools in the Daviess County district and a major athletic and fine arts addition to Owensboro High School.

As issues and opportunities arise, as public decisions and policies are considered, the foundation strives to be a resource for *information*, a facilitator of timely and substantive public *deliberation*, and an advocate for grass roots civic *action*.





Communications: e-publication, website, public access broadcasting

The *Public Life Advocate* reaches more than 1,300 subscribers. This includes most of those involved in the mainstream of community affairs and does not include those who are forwarded the publication by others: co-workers, family, friends, etc.

In 2008, our foundation website received:

Our home page is the top visited page, followed closely by the latest edition of the *Public Life Advocate*.

Public access television channel OCTV broadcast six programs in 2008 profiling the activities of the "We the People" groups. OCTV also continues to cover meetings of Citizens Health Care Advocates and other meetings and events upon request.

Outreach and collaboration

Citizen groups supported by the foundation also maintain websites, publish newsletters, make presentations to civic and service clubs, and appear on radio and television talk shows. The foundation fosters collaboration between community groups and citizens with complementary civic interests.

Dialogue & Deliberation

Citizens help shape a vision for downtown

The foundation and the "We the People" Initiative played an important role in facilitating public participation in the downtown master planning process. Dozens of meetings with stakeholder groups, community leaders and the public at-large were convened and promoted over several months. More than 500 citizens had a meaningful role in crafting a master plan and implementation strategy for our downtown.

Technology enhances citizen engagement

The foundation acquired the technology used during the "We the People" Town Meeting that enables forum participants to be polled with individual keypads, producing instant results with demographic analysis.

This technology was used during a downtown master planning public meeting hosted by the "We the People" Initiative. Participants ranked qualities, features and design preferences they envision for Owensboro's downtown.

Forum on tax inequities

The foundation partnered with Citizens for Good Government in hosting a public forum on disparities in local taxation. A summary of tax inequities in city, county and school districts was presented – including long-term financial comparisons of taxation depending on where one owns property or works.

Examining the exploding prison population problem



The foundation met with public defenders, prosecutors, defense attorneys, judges, jailer and social workers to examine the exploding prison population problem. The foundation published an issue brief on the topic as various state governmental officials and committees take steps to address the issue.

The foundation will monitor these

developments and promote continued public dialogue on this issue as is warranted.

Presentations and deliberative dialogue with students

The foundation continued the practice of engaging students in deliberative dialogue, whereby issues are presented objectively and options are examined in an effort to establish common ground for action. In 2008, sessions were conducted at Owensboro Community and Technical College and Brescia University, introducing students to many of the issues and strategic options that were examined in the "We the People" Town Meeting.

Bellewood Children's Services

At the suggestion of Susie Alford, the foundation hosted two meetings to facilitate communication and collaboration between local youth service providers and Bellewood Children's Services of Louisville, a Presbyterian outreach program that recently expanded to Owensboro. Bellewood operates children's homes in several cities, but will primarily recruit and train foster parents in our community.

Commonwealth Town Meeting



In 2008, the foundation assumed a leadership role in exploring the interest in a statewide application of deliberative dialogue. We convened an impressive array of policy analysts, philanthropists, those with experience in public deliberation, state networks, public television, academics, business leaders and more. We shared our experience with

the America *Speaks* methodology and discussed issues, techniques, timing and keys to impact.

Several follow-up meetings and conference calls have been held. If funding can be secured, it is our hope that one or more pressing state issues will be examined in a Commonwealth Town Meeting, perhaps in multiple locations across Kentucky, prior to the 2010 session of the state legislature.

Dialogue and collaboration in the philanthropic community

Foundation president Rodney Berry was named to the Kentucky Commission on Philanthropy, a new mechanism to foster communication and collaboration among Kentucky foundations and grant making entities.

A statewide conference is planned for the fall of 2009. The conference will focus on children's health and early childhood development.

Action

"We the People" initiatives

Given that the November 2007 "We the People" Town Meeting was characterized by:

• an unprecedented gathering of citizens from all walks of life and all areas of Owens-



boro-Daviess County (that, in fact, reflected the demographic profile of our community)

- the presentation of clear and balanced information on five key community challenges: education, community/economic development, environment, health and social needs, and government
- structured deliberation on strategic options moderated by trained facilitators

...then it was appropriate for the foundation to stress 2008 as a year of "action" – that is, the implementation of recommendations that came forth from the town meeting.

The "We the People" Initiative can point to progress in all five areas:

Education and Learning Committee

- preparing a Citizen's Guide for getting involved in education
- supporting "Generations United" to facilitate the involvement of seniors in our schools
- partnering with Junior Achievement on a mentoring program

The Region of Opportunity Team


- hosted several meetings in connection with the downtown master plan
- researched the downtown marketplace concept that was integrated into the plan
- promoting expanded bike paths and linkages to the Greenbelt
- encouraged the city and county to purchase the Executive Inn property
- researched the downtown truck traffic problem

The Environmental Impact Council

- researched curbside recycling programs, made site visits to other communities that offer curbside recycling, presented speakers from private firms that provide curbside recycling services in other locations
- · presented a recommendation to county government
- planning a community education campaign

Citizens for Good Government

- developed an Openness and Transparency Pledge for local elected and appointed officials
- hosting a dinner for officials featuring speakers on openness and transparency
- hosted a Local Government 101 public forum



 developing a youth citizenship program with the Wendell Ford Government Education Center at the Owensboro Museum of Science and History



Healthy and Caring Community Group

- supporting programs of the Asset Building Coalition to help low-income individuals and families
- participating in an effort to register eligible youth in Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (K-CHIP)
- collaborating with Community Solutions for Substance Abuse to expand awareness and expand local resources
- co-hosting an event to introduce representatives of local church congregations to health issues
- developed a blog called "We Care Owensboro" to help get the word out about community resources

Staffing and supporting the initiative

Through a special grant from founder John Hager, the foundation was able to absorb the cost of an executive director for the "We the People" Initiative and also provide in-kind support of an office and operating support.

Shelly Nichols, the "We the People" executive director, monitors group activities, consults with the Leadership Council and Executive Board, provides administrative assistance, publishes a newsletter, maintains a website, and recently launched a blog.

"We the People" recently sponsored a professional development session for group leaders. The session was led by management consultant Libby Alexander, former Owensboro United Way executive and "We the People" Theme Team member. Every group was represented.

Leadership support of downtown master plan

Founder John Hager also awarded a leader-ship grant in support of the downtown master plan. This attracted other donors and gave valuable momentum to that important effort.

Action

Center for Civic Initiatives and Nonprofit Development

Several years ago, the foundation conceived and promoted the concept of a facility and service center for civic action: ad hoc civic initiatives, fledgling nonprofit organizations or those with little or no staff or administrative capacity. Such a center would facilitate efficiency and collaboration by clustering nonprofits in a central setting.

Tentative plans call for work spaces and computers for qualifying groups, space for files, meeting rooms, resource and training center, kitchenette and more. A shared receptionist will be able to take messages, schedule the rooms, and more. Rental rates, fees and policies have not yet been established.

The original concept of working through Owensboro Community and Technical College (OCTC) and funding through the Hager Endowment at OCTC was abandoned. However, Audubon Area Community Services seized the opportunity and is incorporating such a center in its new housing facility behind The Springs Medical Center.

The foundation looks forward to working closely with AACS as the facility is developed.

Progress on dental clinic

Since examined as a community challenge in a *Public Life Advocate* article in January 2006 (followed by an issue brief published in May 2006), the foundation has been closely involved with efforts to establish a community dental clinic for low-income youth and



adults. Models from other cities have

been examined. The district health department researched the issue and took a leadership role. Local dentists, school nurses and social workers, county government, the Goodfellows Club, Progeny Fund, Hager Foundation and others have been involved. A nonprofit corporation was established, a plan has been developed, clinic space has been leased, improvements are being made, equipment has been ordered, and a fundraising effort has secured more than \$200,000 in gifts and pledges toward a \$300,000 goal.

Progeny Fund grants making a difference

Progeny Fund advisors (Sally Wood, Susie Alford, Bruce Hager and Stewart Hager) refocused the fund's mission and established a strategic grantmaking process for the distribution of \$200,000 in grants annually. In 2008, the following grants were awarded:
